NDP SUPPORT REACHES NEW LOW


Progressive Conservatives Take 22-Point Lead Over New Democrats

Winnipeg – This Probe Research survey of 1,012 Manitoba adults, conducted exclusively for the *Winnipeg Free Press* reveals that nearly one-half of Manitobans presently support the Brian Pallister-led Progressive Conservative Party (48%, up from 43% in September).

The proportion of Manitobans who would cast a ballot for Premier Greg Selinger's NDP, meanwhile, decreased from 29 percent in September to 26 percent in this current sounding. Support for the Manitoba Liberals, who are now led by Rana Bokhari, is unchanged at 20 percent. Six percent of those surveyed would cast a ballot for the provincial Greens or another party not represented in the Legislature.

"If a provincial election were held tomorrow, which party's candidate would you be most likely to support?"





One-in-five Manitobans surveyed (22%) were undecided or refused to point to a party they would support in a hypothetical provincial election.

PCs Now Have Substantial Lead in Winnipeg

The most significant shift in voter support is occurring in Winnipeg, where the PCs now have the backing of four-in-ten decided voters (41%, +4% versus September). Support for the NDP, meanwhile, has slipped to 29 percent (down from 36% in September and substantially lower than the 52 percent support the party recorded in the city in the 2011 election). The Liberal share of the urban vote, meanwhile, has increased just marginally during the past three months (23%, +2% versus September).

Outside Winnipeg, a solid majority of voters continue to prefer the PCs (58%, up from 52% in September). The NDP (21%, +2% versus September) and the Liberals (15%, -3%) remain far behind the PCs outside of Winnipeg.

Within Winnipeg, the Progressive Conservatives now have a statistically significant lead in most city neighbourhoods, including a huge advantage over the NDP in northeast Winnipeg (64%, versus 27%). The only area where the NDP continue to hold a lead over their PC and Liberal rivals is in the Core area (39%, versus 28% for the Liberals and 22% for the PCs). The Liberals are also statistically tied with the PCs in southeast Winnipeg (35% and 31%, respectively, compared to just 24% for the NDP).

This province-wide survey was designed and conducted by Probe Research Inc. via telephone interviews conducted between December 6th and December 16th, 2013 among a random and representative sampling of 1,012 Manitoba adults. With a sample of 1,012, one can say with 95 percent certainty that the results are within +/- 3.1 percentage points of what they would have been if the entire adult population of Manitoba had been interviewed. The margin-of-error is higher within each of the survey's population sub-groups. Modified random-digit dialing was used to ensure that all Manitoba adults would have an equal opportunity to participate in this Probe Research survey. Minor statistical weighting has been applied to this sample to ensure that the age and gender balance correspond with the province as a whole.
